15. Scientists at the Royal Ontario Museum identified osteosarcoma, a malignant bone cancer, in a specimen of Centrosaurus, a herbivorous horned dinosaur that lived about 76 million years ago. It's the first confirmed diagnosis of malignant cancer in a dinosaur, according to a paper published in the medical journal Lancet Oncology.
